Plans Underway for Sumi'nungwa Hopi Festival 2024

First Mesa, Ariz. - August 15, 2024 Plans are currently underway for this year's Sumi'nungwa Hopi Festival, which is scheduled for September 28 – 29, 2024 at the Hopi Veteran's Memorial Center in Kykotsmovi, Ariz. on the Hopi reservation.

Last year's festival turned out to be a successful event despite the high winds that blew off and on, but that didn't put a damper on festival goers as attendance was high. The festival attracted over 100 native arts & craft and food vendors combined, as well as ten social dance groups who performed at a makeshift plaza on the south side of the center.

Theron Honyumptewa, Co-sponsor and spokesperson for his family, who sponsors the festival anticipates that this year's event will go as smoothly as possible. "It was a new location for us last year, so we had to figure out where things would go as far as the makeshift plaza, food vendors, rest area for the dance groups, the overflow of the arts & craft vendors and parking. It was a learning experience for us as the sponsors. Now, we have a general idea of what worked and what needs to be improved. We have approximately two and a half months to get our floor plans finalized, along with getting the outside areas prepped which includes bringing in heavy equipment to level off areas that need leveling and such. That sounds like a lot of time to work with, but it really is not. We have a lot of physical labor work ahead of us. Sponsoring a huge caliber event such as the Sumi'nungwa Hopi Festival requires planning, preparation, and man power and of course, financing." stated Honyumptewa.

Flyers have been posted locally and through social media. Vendor registration has been ongoing since June and will continue up to the date of the event. The vendor fee this year has increased to \$40.00 per vendor, per day (Arts & Crafts or Food.) Due to safety precautions, this year there will be a limit of only fifty-two arts & craft vendor spaces in the gymnasium. This is a huge drop from seventy-two in 2023. The overflow of arts & craft vendors will be assigned a space outdoors at a designated area, therefore it is highly encouraged that vendors register as soon as possible to get access to an indoor space. All food vendors will be set up outdoors in their own designated area, which will be included near the makeshift plaza area. For the arts & craft vendors, a peddler's permit is required, as is an updated food handler's card for food vendors. All vendors should be registered to conduct business at the festival. Non-registered vendors will not be permitted to sell. Furthermore, walking vendors will not be allowed. A peddler's permit has a fee on its own for non-Hopi tribal members. For inquires call the Hopi Revenue Office at (928) 734-3172.

New to this year's Sumi'nungwa Hopi Festival, is the Clan Run. The designee for this year's clan run is for Fathers. Running in honor and recognition of their fathers, whether it be their biological, godfathers or stepfathers. Either way it is meant to bring togetherness among families to celebrate the importance of having a father and bringing life of longevity to all. With the addition of the clan run, Honyumptewa says, "It would be beneficial for everyone to come together and participate as one to recognize all the clans that exist within the Hopi/Tewa communities. It's important that we recognize who we are, and never forget that." The clan run is scheduled for Saturday, September 28th starting at 4:00 p.m. at the festival site. This is a free event and is open to anyone who wants to participate.

The popular 10K & 5K races will return once again for 2024. These races are open to all male and female runners of all abilities. The courses are very challenging with majority of it consisting of soft sandy trails, with steep hills and beautiful scenery atop a plateau with cedar trees overlooking down to the Hopi Veteran's Memorial Center. Last year, several runners expressed their appreciation for the challenging 10K course, and how they found it difficult, yet challenging as the run progressed. Races are scheduled for Sunday, September 29th with the 10k starting promptly at 3:00 p.m., followed by the 5k at 3:05 p.m. Runners should be at the starting point by 2:40 p.m. to receive instructions from the race official.

Pottery Medallions will be awarded to the top thirty overall finishers in each race. As in the past, the pottery medallions are being donated by Hopi Potter, Barbara Polacca of First Mesa. Registration for the races will be on-site only on September 28th from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., and on September 29th from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Registration fee is \$30.00 per runner, 10k or 5k. Only cash, money orders or Zelle will be accepted. Each runner will receive a commemorative t-shirt with paid registration.

Event sponsors are currently soliciting for social dance groups to perform for festival attendees. An invitation is open to all Hopi and Tewa Villages to bring a dance group. Other non-Hopi social dance groups are also invited to perform. As always, a dance group from Zuni Pueblo from New Mexico attended last year's event and showcased their Comanche dance, as did the Bird Dancers from the Gila River Indian reservation. Micah Chapella is the designated leader for the Sumi'nungwa Hopi Festival dance group which opens the dances with their first performance. This year's dance group type has not yet been determined.

Parking for the festival will be the same as last year, with the general parking designated at Lewis Pavinyama's residence in Kykotsmovi (milepost 374) which is approximately one mile south of the event site. Free shuttle service will be provided from Pavinyama's, to and from the event. Shuttle service will end thirty minutes after the ending time of the festival each day. There will be no type of vending at the Pavinyama's pick up/drop off point. There will be designated parking areas for the Handicap, vendors and dance groups at the event site, as well as for Emergency vehicles. According to Honyumptewa, he feels that the general parking situation and the shuttle service, although new worked out very well last year with only a few complaints. Overall, everyone was transported to and from the event site safely by the volunteer shuttle drivers.

The wheels are now turning at a rapid pace as this year's festival is fast approaching. "It may be July now, but September will come very quickly, and we need to have all our ducks in a row, so to speak." Honyumptewa stated. The sponsors of the Sumi'nungwa Hopi Festival extends an invitation to everyone to come and join the weekend festivities with a wide variety of arts & crafts from as far as the Pueblos of New Mexico, to our local Hopi/Tewa artisans, not to mention all the savory food, social dances and of course the very popular 10k & 5k races as well as the inaugural Clan Run. "Our annual event does not discriminate against anyone. Everyone is welcome to be amongst family, relatives, and friends. It's also a great time to make new friends, or catching up with those relatives or community members that you may not have seen for a while. It's the gathering of all people, thus the name Sumi'nungwa." stated Honyumptewa.

Volunteers for this year's festival will be in high demand for various aspects of the event. This includes set up, security, parking attendants, race registration, race spotters, etc. If interested in volunteering, please call (928) 737-0174 or either of the cell phone numbers listed below.

Note* All vendors. There is no WIFI available on site at the Hopi Veterans Memorial Center, if you conduct business using a Square card reader.

To register for a vendor space, please call (928) 737-0174, (480) 495-8808 or (480) 495-8809. For lodging reservations, call the Hopi Cultural Center at (928) 734-2401. There will be no camping allowed at the festival site.

In November 2000, the Hopi Tribal Council took a significant step to realize their vision by enacting Ordinance #54. As a form of community investment, the Council established the Hopi Education Endowment Fund (HEEF) by allocating an initial contribution of \$10 million from tribal funds into a perpetually endowed fund. The ordinance also designated the HEEF as a 7871(a) charitable, non-profit public benefit program focused on the educational needs and purposes of the Hopi Tribe. According to Ordinance #54, the primary objectives of the HEEF include providing ongoing financial assistance to Hopi students of all ages, supporting educational research, funding educational programs, and promoting charitable and educational activities.

Hopi Tribe Department of Health and Human Services Covid-19 Emergency Response - Re-publication

Kykostmovi, Ariz. – June 26, 2024 Immunizations are your best defense against severe illness if you are diagnosed with the Flu, RSV and CIVID-19. The season of germs and viruses will continue to be amongst us; the best protection to avoid severe illness and sickness is to get updated on your family's immunizations. You may have been hearing family discussing COVID-19 diagnosis being a result of large gatherings within the month of June. Gatherings with family during the summer season is common due to the ceremonial and cultural activities, graduation celebrations, birthday celebrations and planting parties.

The Hopi Health Care Center encourages and recommends the following:

- 1. Everyone 6 months and older, regardless of current vaccination status, should get an updated COVID-19 vaccine to protect against COVID-19 illness.
 - 2. People with symptoms should still mask and get tested for

COVID-19.

- 3. Those with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 illness should continue to follow current guidelines for isolation including staying home and wearing a mask around others for at least 5 days after their symptoms started or after a positive test if no symptoms.
- 4. Those exposed to COVID-19 should continue to follow recommendations including wearing a mask around others.
- 5. People may choose to wear a mask at any time based on personal preference, but may be required in other places by local authorities (i.e., individual villages, businesses, and schools).

Many individuals and family members have deterred from the practice of wiping down frequently touched surfaces and staying home when ill. Get back in the habit of wiping down frequently touched surfaces to eliminate germs to protect family from illness. Most important message is for one to stay home if you have flu like symptoms to avoid getting others ill.

Annual Rabies Vaccination Clinic & Dog Tick Collar Event on Hopi

Kykostmovi, Ariz. – July 2024 The Office of Public Health Compliance/Department of Health & Human Services in partnership with the Indian Health Service – Office of Environmental Health, the Community Health Representative program, two CHR summer workers, and a Sichomovi Village Administration staff implemented a Rabies Vaccination Clinic for dogs and cats. Seresto brand tick collars were also placed on on dogs. The group began in Upper & Lower Moencopi, Hotevilla, and Bacavi on June 25, 2024. Ms. Toria Davis-Foster, DVM, DACVPM – USDA, APHIS Veterinary Service Fiop, administered the rabies vaccinations.

On June 26th & 27th, the group worked in the heat setting up in centralized locations in 1st, 2nd & 3rd Mesa villages and communities, ending in Keams Canyon to provide the services for pets. At Polacca Circle M Store on the last day, the group was drenched in a down pour which cooled and re-energized everyone.

Within the three days, 236 dogs and 54 cats received rabies vaccinations. A total of 290 animals are now protected against rabies for a year. In addition, 255 tick collars were placed on dogs.

Rabies is a deadly, but preventable, viral disease found in mammals that can be transmitted to humans most often through the bite of a rabid animal. The rabies virus infects the central nervous system, causing disease in the

brain and ultimately death. In April 2024, there were 14 positive animal cases of rabies in Arizona. In June 2024, the numbers dropped to 4 cases with one case of a rabid fox in Navajo County. Thus far there have not been any cases of rabies on Hopi. But dogs and cats are free roaming on Hopi and cannot be monitored 100% of the time. They may come in contact with wild infected animals while outside. It is very important that they are protected by receiving the rabies vaccine.

Pets that are infected with rabies can bite their owners, infecting them. This is why everybody who is bitten by an animal should seek medical care and report the bite to the local Animal Control Program.

The tick collars are placed on dogs to help keep them tick-free because brown dog ticks are found to live and feed off Hopi dogs. So far, the ticks are not infected with the Rocky Mountain spotted fever (RMSF) bacteria but there is a possibility they may become infected. Hopi has not had a RMSF outbreak thus far. If a person is bitten by a tick or has been around dogs with ticks and has a fever, headache, chills, and a rash, they should see a doctor right away.

Thank you to all the pet owners for bringing your pets to get rabies vaccinations and dog tick collars. These preventive measures can keep you and your pets healthy.

2024 HOPI TRIBAL **HUNTING PROCLAMATION**

Kykotsmovi, Ariz. - August 15, 2024 The Hopi Tribe Wildlife & Ecosystem Management Program (WEMP) of the Hopi Tribe's

Department of Natural Resources (DNR) are pleased to offer 2024 hunting opportunities for Hopi Tribal members and non-Hopi Tribal members on the Hopi reservation. This Proclamation informs the public of the annual 2024 tribal hunting activities and enforces compliance of regulations by the Hopi Tribe.

Upon Tribal Council approval, this document will govern the activities of Big Game Hunts for elk and deer administered through WEMP. The license year for the Hopi Tribal Hunting

Proclamation will begin on August 12, 2024 and end on December 31, 2024. By the Hopi Tribal Hunting Proclamation that has been set forth, only WEMP may issue hunting permits for big game species on the Hopi Reservation.

The fees collected from the 2024 Hunting Proclamation will be deposited into the Wildlife Fund recognized in the Hopi Tribe's Ordinance #48 (Wildlife) Section 10.00. The funds will be used by WEMP to support the wildlife management needs of the Tribe that include administering a hunting program and preserving wildlife resources.

Mandatory Orientation is required for new applicants, failure to attend will result in no permit being issued as well as no refund. Mandatory Check-in of all successful harvested deer/elk and Post-Hunt Survey are required. Failure to check-in harvest within 24 hours of harvest and submit survey by 5 pm on the first Friday after your hunt ends will result in ineligibility to hunt that species in 2025.

Please read the 2019-2024 Hopi Hunting and Trapping Regulations booklet for hunter eligibility and other pertinent information. It is the Hunter's responsibility to be educated and informed on the Hopi Hunting and Trapping Regulations.

What's New for 2024

The Hopi Wildlife Ecosystems Management Program Office has a set total amount of permits available for all hunts on a First-Come, First-Serve process, Monday through Friday, regular business hours, Arizona time.

Articles should not exceed 750 words and should follow Associated Press (AP) style and formatting. The Managing Editor reserves the right to edit articles for style, length and clarity. If significant editing is required, the Managing Editor will communicate with the author prior to publication.

PRESS RELEASES:

Press releases must be submitted on official letterhead and include the name of the organization, contact person, telephone number and email address. Press releases should not exceed 500 words and submissions may be edited for length and clarity at the discretion of the Managing Editor.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:

Letters should not exceed 250 words and must include the name of the author and complete contact information (address, phone number or email address)

and the headline and date of the article on which you are commenting. Anonymous letters and letters written under pseudonyms will not be published. The Tutuveni Editorial Board reviews all submissions and reserves the right not to publish letters it considers to be highly sensitive or potentially offensive to readers, or that may be libelous or slanderous in nature.

OPINION EDITORIALS:

Submissions must be exclusive to Hopi Tutuveni and should not exceed 1,000 words. Include with your submission your name and complete contact information, along with a short 2-3-sentence

All press releases, articles, letters to the editor and Opinion Editorials electronically as a Word document or as plain text in the body of an email to the Managing Editor, Romalita Laban. Articles, press releases and editorials that include photographs must be in high resolution, 300dpi or more and must be your own. All photographs must include photo credit and a caption for each photo listing the names of all persons included in the photo and description of what the photo is about. PERMIT SALE DATES

All permits sales will start at 9 am, Monday, August 12, except for Any Left-Over General Elk permits (see below). All permits will available until they are sold out for each hunt or until 12 pm, Friday, the last day of sale for that hunt.

A complete application package for all Archery permits must be submitted prior to receiving a permit. Complete packages include a properly completed 1) Hunt Application and 2) Permit Fee (includes processing fee in permit)

- -Deer/Elk Archery Hunt: Open to enrolled Hopi Tribal Members only.
- -Archery Application Package Deadline is August 30, 2024
- A complete application package for all General permits must be submitted prior to receiving a permit. Complete packages include a properly completed 1) Hunt Application, 2) Application Processing Fee (S20.00) and 3) Permit Fee.
- Minor Any Elk/Deer: Open to Hopi members ages 14-17 (at the time off hunt), must show and carry proof of completion of hunter education to hunt. 13 year olds may apply, however they must turn 14 before they can hunt. They must also be accompanied by a responsible adult while hunting.
- Minor Any Elk Application Package Deadline is September 6, 2024.
- Minor Antlered Deer Application Package Deadline is September 13, 2024
- All General Elk: Open to enrolled Hopi Tribal Members first. Hopi Tribal Members and members enrolled with Federal Recognized or Canadian First Nations Tribe may apply for a permit through the Left-Over Permit sales process.
- All General Elk Application Package Deadline is September 6, 2024
- Left-Over General Elk permits, which were not purchased by Hopi Tribal members, will be made available on the First-Come, First-Serve process beginning at 9 am Monday, September 9, 2024 until 12 pm, September 13, 2024 for Non-Tribal members, who are members of federally recognized Native American Tribes or Canadian First Nations Tribes. This does not exclude Hopi Tribal Members from purchasing permits.
- Left-Over General Elk permits will sell very quickly. Applicants are advised to check with the Department before submitting an application for Left-Over permits.
- Deer Hunt: Open to enrolled Hopi Tribal Members only.
- General Deer Application Package Deadline is September 13, 2024.



HOW DO I REGISTER?

You can register to vote online by going to https://servicearizona.com/VoterRegistration/ and completing the Online Voter Registration

You can also print, complete, and sign a paper Voter Registration Form and mail or hand-deliver it to your County Recorder.

WHAT IF I NEED ACCOMMODATIONS?

In Arizona, you have the right to vote protected by federal law. Election staff must be trained on and respect the right to:

- Accessible voter registration
- Accessible polling places
- Accessible, available, and operational voting systems, features
- The right to vote privately and independently or with assistance, if needed

WHAT IF I AM BEING DENIED ACCOMMODATIONS?

If you are being denied access to registration or voting and/or require assistance with registering and casting your vote, please contact the Native American Disability Law Center.

The Native American Disability Law Center is a non-profit law firm that protects the rights of individuals with disabilities, including providing protection and advocacy for voting access.


